Your Excellency Mr. President,

It is of paramount importance, I think, to follow thoroughly the way in which Public Law embraces a Municipality, a Region, a State and, in the end, the whole Europe and its Member States. Only then, I think, will we all realise that the relationship between the Local Government and the European Union is a win—win relationship. This is so, because the contribution of the Local Government to the European Project, apart from being a need of vital importance for the organisation and function of the latter, also constitutes the most efficient way to further reinforce the political coherence and the overall protection of the democratic institutions of the European Union.
